I wish to obtain a mining permit for an 80 acre parcel 171310-31003. On Nov. 30, 2015 with CUP2015-051 I was granted use of the parcel for a limited purpose landfill to work in conjunction with my existing LPL directly north of it. Being able to mine the areas before using it for the landfill adds to the quantity of rock available for the future.

There will be no structures. The same haul roads used presently for my current mining and the LPL will be used. This only adds to my available rock and will not increase traffic. The same number of employees will remain the same.

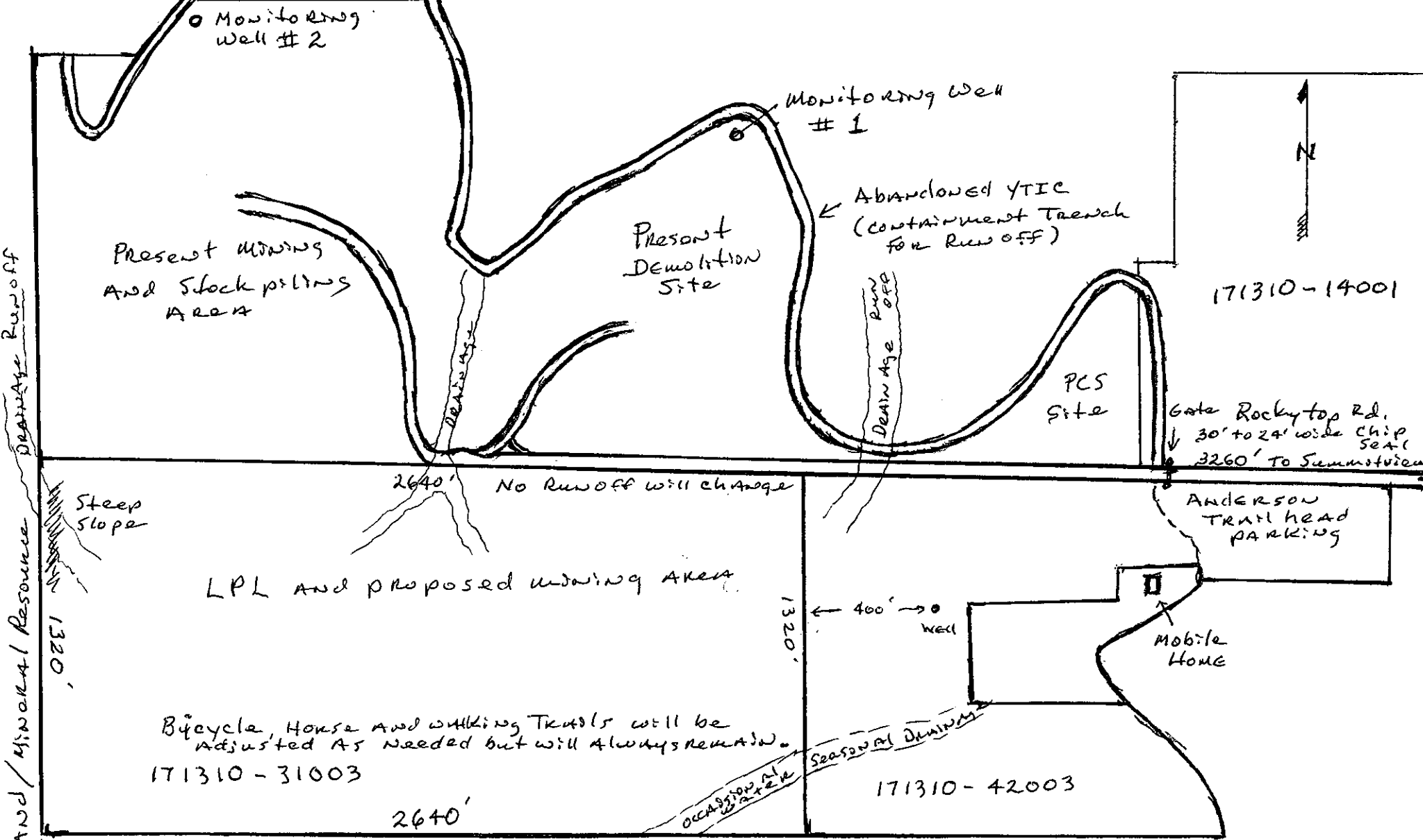
This additional area will mean mining will be located further from existing residences.

The hours of operation will remain the same as for my other mining areas and LPL, 6 to 6 6 days a week.

Reclamation is covered by my existing LPL permit.

The haul road is an extension of Rocky Top Rd. off the Summitview-Cowiche Rd.

In all, this will make it possible to work both the mining and the landfill together with the same operation and requirements we have with our other permits.
